Throughout a long and distinguished career, Todd Brooker, last of the "Crazy Canucks", exemplified a true competitive spirit, recognized on April 8, 1987 when he was awarded the Johnny F. Bassett Memorial Award. This award pays tribute to a Canadian "Champion of Champions", in recognition of, not so much competitive achievement, but caliber of character.

He was a member of the National Alpine ski team for 10-years from 1977 to 1987, competed at the 1984 Winter Olympic Games, Sarajevo, and at the Federation Internationale de Ski (FIS) World Championships at Schladming, Austria, in 1982 and Bormio, Italy in 1985.

During his career he competed in 62 World Cup Downhill events, earned points in six World Cup Final Standings, finishing in the top 15 on no fewer than 33 occasions, 10 podium finishes and 3 World Cup Downhill victories.

A daring skier, his career was troubled by many injuries which eventually forced his retirement in 1987.
