In the late 60s and early 70s, Judy Crawford was one of Canada's most accomplished Alpine skiers. She was an alternate member of the national team at the winter Olympic Games in Grenoble, France in 1968 and, in 1972, competed as a member of the national team at Sapporo, Japan where she missed a Bronze Medal in the Slalom event by a mere fraction of a second, finishing in 4th place in the Combined standings.

On her 16th birthday in 1967, she became the first Ontario-based skier to make the Canadian Women's Alpine Ski team and remained with the team for seven years until her retirement in 1974. She was also a member of the Canadian Federation Internationale de Ski (FIS) team in 1970 and 1974.

In March 1971, at Aspen, Colorado, U.S.A., Judy won the United States National Championships, placing 2nd in Giant Slalom and 4th in both Slalom and Downhill events. That year, she also won the Downhill event in the Canadian Championships at Whistler, British Columbia.

In World Cup competition between 1969 and 1974, she finished among the top ten competitors on no fewer than 23 occasions, 5 times in Downhill, 4 in Giant Slalom and 14 times in Slalom. At the Federation Internationale de Ski (FIS) World Championships held in Val Gardena, Italy in 1970, she had a 4th place finish in Downhill and in the 1974 St Moritz, Switzerland, World Championships, she had top ten finishes in both Slalom and Giant Slalom events and finished with a 4th place overall in the Combined.
