

# JUMPING RULES

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## Canadian Amateur Ski Association

ONE of the most important matters the Directors of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association have had to consider is the standardizing of the rules governing ski-jumping tournaments and the adopting of a set of standard rules, that while placing the necessary premium on style, and being perfectly fair and in keeping with the best practices of the sport here and abroad should be so simple that they can be used in the smaller places by more or less inexperienced judges. At the last Annual Meeting of the Association this question again came up for discussion and it was decided that the time had now come when a definite move must be made, and the President was empowered to appoint a committee to study the entire subject.

Meanwhile the Eastern United States Amateur Ski Association, after much thought, had adopted a provisional set of rules embracing the good points of the Norwegian, the National U.S.A. and the Canadian. Professor Chas. A. Proctor, of Dartmouth University, a member of the Rules Committee of the E.U.S.A.S.A. and an authority on this subject, very kindly took a keen interest in the matter and furnished the President with complete information and with a comparison of the principal jumping rules in use at present. All this valuable data was early in the summer placed in the hands of the committee, consisting of: A. C. Harlow, Montreal Ski Club; T. J. Morin, Ottawa Ski Club; W. F. C. Devlin, Cliffside Ski Club; C. Loken, Renfrew Ski Club; for their consideration and action in the fall. The committee have decided to try out for this season the rules of the United States Association with a slight modification. I wish to express my personal thanks and those of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association to Professor Proctor for his invaluable assistance. The rules, as adopted for trial this season, follow.
