

SCORING

Section 61.—In Downhill and Slalom races, the times made by the members of the same team (with the exception of the competitor placed last in each team, see Section 59) shall be added together, and the sum total gives the standing of the team. If two or several teams are tied, then these teams shall be placed according to the best individual times made by their members.

In the combined race by teams, the score of the teams shall be computed in the different tests as shown in the previous paragraph. In each test, the best team obtains 100 points; the score of the following teams is figured as in the individual races (see Section 51). The total points made by each team in the various tests is divided by the number of these tests. The figure thus obtained represents the final score.

If two or several teams obtain the same final score, the team making the best individual time in the Downhill race shall be placed first. If the individual results in a Downhill race should be practically equal, when figured out to the decimals, the teams shall be considered ex-aequo.

MINUTES

of the C.A.S.A. Meetings

MINUTES of the Fourteenth Annual Meeting of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association held at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, February 23, 1934.

THE Meeting was called to order at 7.30 p.m.

Present: Mr. Gordon W. Dunn, President, in the Chair; Mr. C. E. Mortureux, Vice-President; Mr. G. B. Arnaud, Secretary-Treasurer, and the following duly accredited representatives:—Laurentian Cross-Country Ski Club, Mr. N. Berger; Montreal Ski Club, Mr. H. C. Chisholm, Mr. F. F. L. Rolland; Ottawa Ski Club, Mr. L. Grimes; Red Birds Ski Club, Mr. H. Pangman; Seigneurie Ski Club, Mr. B. Meredith; Viking Ski Club, Mr. R. Sivertsen; Val Morin Ski Club, Mr. H. S. Johannsen; St. Agathe Ski Club, Mr. T. Mamen; St. Jovite Ski Club, Mr. N. C. D. McTaggart; Three Rivers Ski Club, Mr. H. P. Britten; Toronto Ski Club, Mr. H. T. Cliff; Mr. C. L. Wilson; Cliffside Ski Club, Mr. S. R. Lockeberg; there were also present Mr. H. P. Douglas, Mr. W. T. Pickering, Mr. E. St. Pierre, Mr. W. B. Thompson.

THE Secretary read the notice calling the meeting. The Minutes of the Thirteenth Annual Meeting as printed in the Annual were confirmed. The Financial Report of the Association was read and adopted.

IN a brief resumé the President sketched the events of the past year, pointing out the early snowfall and continued cold weather had greatly encouraged the sport, resulting in a satisfactory increase in membership lists. He placed considerable stress upon the finding of a better method of funding the Association's expenses and made the suggestion that a nominal per capita charge be placed upon each and every member of the Association. This would make conditions easier for the smaller clubs, and, at the same time, not materially burden the larger ones.

The President explained the progress made by Nels Nelsen, President of the Western Division, towards uniting the western clubs and advised that a request had been received from the West for the 1935 Dominion Championships. He told the delegates present that two new clubs had joined the Association in Eastern Canada, namely, the Val Morin Ski Club and the St. Sauveur Sports Club. With the idea of trying out the group system of management, a Board had been formed in the Province of Quebec under the chairmanship of Mr. Chris. Tollefsen and the results of their labour was shown in the marked betterment of the Quebec clubs. He recommended that serious thought be given to this Provincial or District system of group management.

In closing, the President thanked Mr. Sig. Lockeberg, Chairman of the Technical Board, and his Officers for the capable way in which they handled a long and arduous winter's activities, and he also expressed thanks to the

Honorary President, Mr. H. P. Douglas, for the good work he had done in this year's Annual and the hope that he would continue to take charge of this publication.

MR. S. R. LOCKEBERG, Chairman of the Technical Board, handed in a written report covering the Ontario Championships held February 9 and 10, 1934, at Toronto, and at the Seigneurie Club competition held on February 3 and 4, 1934, at Montbello, mentioning that it had been his hope to present to the meeting a complete report of the year's activities, but through illness was unable to do so. Mr. Lockeberg, however, gave a verbal resumé of those outstanding matters which had been handled by his office during the year, and the meeting went on record expressing thanks and appreciation for the valuable work done by him and his Board.

MR. H. P. DOUGLAS, the Honorary President, handed in a report of the Special Committee appointed at the Annual Meeting, February 25, 1933, reading as follows: "Report of the Special Committee appointed at the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association, February 25, 1933. The Western situation has entirely changed since the resignation of Rudolph J. Verne as President of the Western Association. Nels Nelsen is now President and he and his Western Directors are very desirous of working in close harmony with the East, and your Committee begs to report that they consider the present Western situation most satisfactory."

"Your Committee have approved of the amendments to the By-Laws and the same amendments are adopted and incorporated in the 1933 Ski Annual and shown under Sections 15 to 30 on Page 57.

"Your Committee also recommends that they do not consider it advisable to make any changes to the present By-Laws this year until they have further opportunity to confer with the Western Association.

Your Committee favours the formation of the various ski centres of Canada into ski districts which may eventually, when the need of such arises, form ski boards for their local government. These Boards to work in close co-operation with the Technical Ski Board of the C.A.S.A. The name of the various ski districts and the extent of territory which each shall cover to be decided upon by a specially appointed Committee.

THE revisions to the By-laws suggested at the last Annual Meeting and shown under Sections 15 to 30, Page 57, of the Canadian Ski Annual were presented to the Meeting and their adoption by the Committee appointed was ratified by the Meeting.

A report was submitted by Mr. C. Tollefsen, Chairman of the Province of Quebec Ski Board. A general discussion of the merits of this system took place, and it was unanimously decided to follow this procedure through the entire country. A difference of opinion, however, existed as to whether these bodies would represent Provinces or Districts and as the acceptance or rejection of the new proposed By-laws which had been placed before the Meeting would largely govern this feature, it was decided to withhold further action until a decision regarding the new Constitution had been reached.

MR. DOUGLAS stated that he would be glad to assume the editorship of the Annual for another year.

Mr. Douglas reported that the Ski Annual would be published next year, he hoped, on an entirely different plan than heretofore. It is proposed to issue the Annual in the form of a larger magazine, on a better class of paper and possibly double the size of the present one. The Annual will be distributed not later than November 1, 1934. All clubs have already been requested to form committees to assist in securing articles, advertising and in general to co-operate with the Editor.

The Annual would no longer be distributed gratis to members, but its sale would be handled by the clubs on a basis that would give them a margin of profit.

ELECTION to membership of the following Clubs were duly confirmed:—St. Sauveur Sports Club, Val Morin Ski Club.

TO encourage the smaller clubs not yet in a financial position to pay the regular Association fee, it was moved and seconded that a new class of membership to be known as an Associate Membership be inaugurated at a fee of \$5.00. This Associate Membership would not carry with it any voting power.

THAT this Meeting approve the affiliation of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association with the National Ski Association of America.

THAT the entry of Peter Robinson, member of the Toronto Ski Club in the F.I.S. and Alpina Events be confirmed.

THAT the following having complied with the requirements of the Association, their reinstatement to amateur standing be approved:—Nels Nelsen, Merritt G. Putman, Ivind Nelsen. Harold Mines, a member of the Montreal Ski Club, having taken the position of paid ski instructor, was declared a professional.

THAT the following were duly appointed Judges for the Dominion Championships being held on February 24 and 25, 1934, under the auspices of the Three Rivers Ski Club:—Mr. S. R. Lockeberg, Mr. N. Berger, Mr. W. T. Pickering.

THE President was given the power to award the Dominion Championships to Western Canada, provided the Western Clubs remitted their arrears of dues to the Association, thereby placing themselves in good standing. In the event that this ruling is not complied with, the Dominion Championships are to be awarded to the Montreal Ski Club, who had placed their request for same in the hands of the Executive previous to the request from Western Canada being received. If the Dominion Championships be awarded to the West, it was agreed unanimously to compensate the Montreal Ski Club by awarding them a Championship meet to be known as the Eastern Canada Championships, this meet to be held in the last week in February, 1935, Montreal Ski Club to supply major prize, the Association to supply silver and bronze medals for second and third class.

THE following Tournaments were awarded for 1935:—Dominion Championships, see above; Province of Quebec Championships, third week-end in February, Viking Ski Club; Ontario Championships, second week-end in February, Ottawa Ski Club; St. Maurice Valley Championships, first week-end in February, Three Rivers Ski Club; The Kandahar Race was awarded to the Red Birds Ski Club.

THAT the proposed change in the By-laws as submitted to the Meeting by the Montreal Ski Club, the Viking Ski Club and the Laurentian Cross Country Ski Club be left with a Committee composed of the following for their recommendations, to be placed before a General Meeting to be called during August, 1934, the date to be decided by the President; and that this Meeting be adjourned until that time, and the present officers to remain in office until the date of that meeting. Committee: Mr. C. Tollefsen, Mr. H. T. Cliff, Mr. C. E. Mortureux, Mr. Gordon W. Dunn, Mr. H. P. Douglas. The Meeting then adjourned.

MINUTES of the adjourned Fourteenth Annual Meeting of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association, held at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, August 28, 1934.

THE Meeting was called to order at 8.00 p.m.

Present: Mr. Gordon W. Dunn, President, in the Chair; Mr. T. J. Gillians, Secretary-Treasurer; and the following accredited representatives:—Laurentian Cross Country Ski Club, Mr. E. Cochand; Cliffside Ski Club, Mr. H. H. Marcou; Montreal Ski Club, Mr. H. C. Chisholm, Mr. F. L. Rolland; Ottawa Ski Club, Mr. C. E. Mortureux, Mr. S. R. Lockeberg; Red Birds Ski Club, Mr. H. Pangman; Seignior Ski Club, Mr. G. Kennedy; Viking Ski Club, Mr. E. Pihl; Val Morin Ski Club, Mr. H. S. Johannsen; St. Agathe Ski Club, Mr. C. W. Honey; St. Jovite Ski Club, Mr. F. H. Wheeler; St. Sauveur Sports Club, Mr. V. Nymark; Three Rivers Ski Club, Mr. H. Olsen; Toronto Ski Club, Mr. A. Wilson, Mr. C. T. Wilson; there were also present, Mr. H. P. Douglas, Mr. W. B. Thompson, Mr. C. F. Tollefsen, Mr. O. Hjertholm, Mr. E. St. Pierre, Mr. C. H. Moore, Mr. A. Grant, Mr. B. Morton, and several members of the Press.

The Secretary read the notice calling the Meetings. The President extended a cordial welcome to the delegates and visitors present.

MR. DUNN read the report of the Committee appointed at the Meeting of February 23, to consider the advisability of adopting the amended By-laws submitted to that meeting. The decision of the Committee, by a majority vote, was to the effect that it was not advisable at the present time to adopt an entirely new Constitution and By-laws, but that a Committee should be appointed to consider revisions to the present Constitution to provide for regional control; said revisions to be effective immediately, subject to ratification at the next General Meeting. After a general discussion, the report was unanimously adopted by the Meeting.

MR. DUNN, the retiring President, expressed his appreciation of the co-operation accorded him during his tenure of office, regretting that conditions did not permit his acceptance of nomination for another term.

The following being duly nominated, were unanimously elected to office for the ensuing year:—Honorary President, Mr. Gordon W. Dunn; President, Mr. W. B. Thompson; Vice-Presidents, Mr. C. E. Mortureux, Mr. Nels Nelsen; Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. T. J. Gillians.

MR. S. R. LOCKEBERG was unanimously re-appointed Chairman of the Technical Board. It was resolved that nominations for members of the Board would be forwarded by the various districts to the Chairman of the Board, who would appoint his Board from among those nominated.

FOLLOWING the recommendations submitted, the following were appointed a Committee to consider revisions to the By-laws to provide for regional control, said revisions to be effective until the next Annual Meeting to which they will be submitted for ratification: Mr. W. B. Thompson, Chairman; G. W. Dunn, F. A. Hall, H. T. Cliff, C. E. Mortureux, H. C. Chisholm, H. P. Douglas, Nels Nelsen, C. F. Tollefsen.

MR. DUNN reported that, in accordance with the powers conferred at the Meeting of February 23, he had endeavoured to arrange that the Western Clubs reinstate themselves, finally advising the West that August 1 was the final date to remit dues. The West had not, however, complied with the ruling. The Meeting unanimously approved Mr. Dunn's actions in this connection and following the resolution adopted at the previous meeting, the Dominion Championships were awarded to the Montreal Ski Club to be held the last week-end in February, 1935.

THE Western situation was discussed at some length and the Meeting went on record as recommending that the incoming Executive give this question their earnest attention and offer every encouragement to the West to organize their clubs on the basis of regional control.

MR. LOCKEBERG read the report referred to in the Minutes of the previous Meeting, giving complete details of the year's activities, and congratulating the officials upon the excellent manner in which the tournaments had been handled. Attention was drawn to the increased interest in the Association's tests. Mr. Lockeberg asked Clubs to consider the question of awarding more prizes for Tournaments in an effort to stimulate entries. Specimens of official score cards and judges certificates were submitted. The report closed by extending thanks to the members of the Technical Board for their co-operation.

APPLICATIONS for membership were submitted from the following clubs:—Full Membership, Ski-To Club; Associate Membership, The Penguins, Wabaskontyunk Outing Club, Loup-Garou Ski Club, International Ski Club.

These applications were referred to the Executive for attention and election when the necessary qualifications had been filled.

MR. JOHANNSEN gave a resumé of the work of making trails in the Laurentians, calling attention to the financial assistance of Mr. S. Dawes, which made possible this invaluable work. A hearty vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Dawes which the Secretary was requested to convey.

The attention of the Meeting was drawn to the recent death of Mr. Johan Saetre, of the United States, a well-known skier, whose passing was regretted by all interested in skiing. The Secretary was requested to convey the sincere sympathy and condolences of the Meeting to the relatives of the late Mr. Saetre.

The Meeting then adjourned.
