LAURENTIAN CROSS COUNTRY SKI CLUB



SIX months of snow in the Laurentians made our 1933-34 season a most successful one. As usual our members were quartered at Chalet Cochand, St. Marguerite Station, which has been greatly improved by a considerable addition. The height of the season came February 10 to 22, with the club field day, and running for the first time in America, the flying kilometre race, particulars of which are given elsewhere in this issue.

During the eight years of its existence, the club, until now, has confined its activities to the building of cross-country trails, of which we now have about fifty-five miles. The success of the field day, however, has created a new interest in racing. With this in view, two new trails have been cut this summer. One laid out by Johannsen and called the snake ski run, has a descent of 412 feet in 1,791 feet distance. The other, the Chalet ski run, laid out by Emile Cochand, has a descent of 426 feet in a distance of 2,310 feet. These new runs were made possible by the generosity of Mr. Sidney Dawes and his friends, who selected our terrain among others to develop downhill racing in the Laurentians.

A new cross-country trail, connecting Richard and Bleke trails, crossing over the shoulder of Mount Miller, is being cut this year. Gilbert cabin, built in the notch between East and West Margaret, destroyed last season by fire, is being rebuilt on a protected shoulder of East Margaret, near the Goddard trail, where there is a particularly fine outlook over the valley of the North River. Mr. Littlejohn, formerly of the Lake Placid Club, was at the headquarters all season giving lessons in ski-ing and conducting cross-country parties. The minor jump has been removed from the "Nursery" and will be rebuilt on the slopes of Mount Cochand. Also the tower at the top of the speedway, where the flying kilometre was held, will be raised to increase the speed next year.
