We hope and expect that the coming season will be an active one and that it will be successful for our club.

SEIGNIORY SKI CLUB

OUR winter months were little short of ideal this year. Snow conditions were superb and in spite of low temperatures some interesting ski meets were held at the Seignior Club.

The highlight of the ski club's activities was certainly the first Canadian intercollegiate ski meet held with considerable success the end of January. Organized within a short period, it nevertheless brought together teams from McGill University, St. Patrick's College, Ottawa, Toronto Varsity and Queen's, the latter two being newcomers to organized intercollegiate winter competitions. The inter-city competition between three Montreal clubs, the Red Birds, Montreal Ski Club and the Viking Ski Club, was held at the same time but only slalom relay races were possible, heavy wind making jumping on the big hill out of the question for the first time.

St. Patrick's College students took the honours of the intercollegiate meet with twenty-eight points. Eddie Connolly, formerly a student at St. Patrick's, scored wins in both the slalom and downhill events, although he had skied very little prior to the meet, giving Queen's University second place with twelve and a half points. McGill was third with ten and a half points and Toronto Varsity, fourth with six points.

The Red Birds Ski Club displayed splendid style and technique in the inter-city contests, their four-man team of Harry Pangman, Walter Dorken, Bill Ball and John Blair, taking the relay and slalom trophies. The Ottawa Ski Club team was second, Montreal Ski Club, third and the Viking Outing Club, fourth.

Later in the season the Red Birds held their annual meet at the Seignior Club, John Blair and Bob Marcou, two of the Red Birds outstanding runners, being victors in the slalom and downhill races respectively. The slalom course was laid out on the steep cleared slope beside the Seignior ski jump tower. The downhill race was along a steep bush run opposite the jumping hill.

Women's inter-city ski races and the annual inter-city jumping competition brought a uniquely interesting ski meet to the Seignior Ski Club during March. The former, the first of its kind to be held in the province, attracted exceptionally strong teams and individual entries from Montreal and Ottawa, the honours going to the Montreal Ski Club team made up by the Misses Peggy Chapman, Alice MacFarlane, Dorothy Michaels and Evelyn McKenna. Miss Chapman won the slalom and Miss MacFarlane the downhill events.

The inter-city jumping event was won by the Ottawa Ski Club. Their team of J. Landry, R. Vincent, L. Fillman and Harold Bagguley, who holds the Seignior Club hill record of 217 feet, earned the greatest number of points, defeating Montreal jumpers by 15 points. K. Evensen of the Viking Ski Club won individual honours of the meet with jumps of 153 feet and 165 feet; L. Lehan of Montreal Ski Club was second with 165 and 157 feet.

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
