ST. MORITZ KILOMETRE

Leo Gasperl, of Kitzbuhel, won the 1934 Flying Kilometre on the special course at St. Moritz, in the record time, 129.263 kilometres an hour (80.35 miles per hour). His maximum speed was 136.849 kilometres per hour (84.39 miles per hour) as compared with the 1932 record of 134.59 kilometres or 83.58 miles per hour.

Gasperl made two descents, one with a stream-like attachment, establishing his record, and the other without this attachment. The differences were slight (135.849 with and 134.228 without).
