Controlled running on the steep course was virtually impossible, the majority of the racers taking the steep upper pitches at high speed, but the tremendous leg strain made repeated falls inevitable on the lower stretches. Billy Ball, for years one of our fastest downhill men, finished second, followed by Baadsvik, less than one second between, and next Harry Pangman, the expert President of the Red Birds.

The Slalom started at 2.30—the first twenty in the downhill qualifying—two runs each. The hard icy surface broken up as much as possible, about one-quarter of a mile, was particularly tricky and difficult, and the flags well and fairly placed by Herman Johannsen. J. S.

Houghton of McGill won in fast time, 72.6, making two almost perfect runs. Gravel, unfortunately, straddled a flag on his first run and misunderstanding instructions and not coming back was disqualified. His second run was done in 72.2 and but for this unfortunate happening he would have easily again won the Combined for the second consecutive time. A study of the times of the competitors gives some indication of the extremely difficult and unusual conditions as on good average snow there would be but seconds difference between the good men. The Combined and the Quebec-Kandahar Cup was won by our grand young ski man Karl Baadsvik of the Viking Ski Club. He was third in the downhill, but eight seconds behind Gravel, and seventh in the Slalom, giving a fine all-round performance in both. In 1933 and again in 1934 he won our highest honors—the C.A.S.A. Combined Championship, and is rightly named for the Olympic Team. Sigurd Lockeberg flew down from Ottawa to be present in his official capacity. ### Dartmouth won Fifth Inter-Collegiate

FOR the fifth successive year, the Dartmouth Cup, tall silver trophy symbolic of the championship of the International Intercollegiate Ski Union, was won by Dartmouth College, Hanover, N.H. The Cup, when the meet was known as the Intercollegiate Winter Sports Union, included snowshoeing and skating, but only ski-ing events—jumping, slaloms, downhill, cross-country, combined are now included in the program. In the three day competition at St. Sauveur, under perfect snow and weather conditions, the charges of Coach Otto Schniebs carried the green of Dartmouth to the fore in every event except the downhill. In all the Hanoverians scored 496.5 points out of a perfect 500—a rare achievement in team ski-ing. Under the scoring system of 100 points for the winning team in each

event, found so successful in the meets between Oxford-Cambridge and McGill University, in Canada and Switzerland, Dartmouth triumphed in the slalom on Thursday, the cross-country Friday and the jumping and combined on the final day.

Winning the downhill event of Friday, McGill was also second in the grand total and second in all the events except the downhill, a really good showing. University of New Hampshire of Durham, N.H., which held the Dartmouth Cup for a full five years prior to the Dartmouth regime from 1931 on, was third with 425.5 points. The University of Toronto, in its first team appearance in the Union's championships, was fifth with 275.5 points. Cornell also entered for the first time, the men from Ithaca finishing sixth. Dartmouth skiers swept the boards in the jumping competition on the intermediate-sized jump by taking the first four positions. Dick Durrance, stocky Dartmouth ace, shot 79 feet through the air on both his jumps for a total pointage of 219.5. Right behind was Henry Woods with leaps of 75 and 79 feet and 214.5 points. Seldon Hannah was third with 215.5 points after jumps of 76 and 78 feet, while Warren Chivers was fourth with 79 and 70 feet and 205.7 points. Ronnie Denton of McGill, who won the title in 1933, was fourth with Taylor Bradbury, also of McGill, sixth. D. J. Bradley, the other member of the Dartmouth squad in the jumping, was seventh.

By virtue of placing second in the 15-kilometre cross-country race and second in the jumping, Henry "Bim" Woods led the Hanover parade in the combined event, which saw Dartmouth take the first five places. Warren Chivers was second with 439.7 points, compared with 454.3 points for Woods. Dick Durrance was third with 438.5 points while Hannah and Bradley carried off the fourth and fifth positions.

Over seven miles of ability-testing terrain Dartmouth won the four-man relay race by 19 seconds from McGill in the final event on Saturday. Although originally intended as part of the competition, the relay was run off as a separate event, with the Whittall Cup at stake. The first man started from the top of Hill 70 and then pounded over the flat, while the second man had his territory evenly divided between uphill and downhill. The final lap was from the very top of Hill 70, a drop of 650 feet in about three-quarters of a mile. McGill took the lead during the first two laps, but lost it on the stiff uphill climb to Dartmouth. Warren Chivers, anchor man for Dartmouth, took the bunting at the top of Hill 70 and on racing skis, waxed to the fullest to counteract the wet snow, sped down the hill at top speed to flash across the finish line while Jack Houghton of McGill was just starting the last downward swoop.

### Red Birds Stage

### Second Inter-scholastic Meet

THE SECOND INTERSCHOLASTIC SKI MEET was held under the auspices of the Red Birds Ski Club, Montreal. It attracted sixty-eight entries representing nine schools. Westmount High No. 1 Team repeated its performance of the year before and won the Interscholastic Shield for the second successive year and by making a clean sweep of all four events, cross-country, jumping, downhill, and slalom, established a record that will be hard to beat.

A change was made in the method of scoring, following the Intercollegiate Ski Union percentage system. The winning team in each event received a hundred points, and the others a corresponding percentage of this in proportion to their time. The total points were then added up.

The jumping was held on Friday afternoon on the Montreal Ski Club's Alex Olsen Jump on the Westmount mountain through the courtesy of the latter Club. While Percy Bott of Montreal High won the event, the Westmount team of Finley, Riddell, Wurtele and McLurg took second, third, fourth and fifth respectively to win by a large margin.

On Saturday the remaining events were held at Shawbridge. A special train was run by the Canadian Pacific Railway and some three hundred school children made the trip. Owing to a bad thaw the week before conditions were not good, but luckily the night before about four inches of new snow fell, followed by extreme cold weather. An icy crust underneath the snow made the skiing very fast.

The first event, the cross-country, attracted the largest number of entries and was about three and a half miles in length. P. Christie of Westmount High won in the fast time of thirty-three minutes flat, but was closely pursued by Tirrell, his team mate. These with Dalton and Ritchie in seventh and eleventh positions gave Westmount its second victory.

After a rest the competitors and officials were entertained at luncheon by the Honorary President of the Red Birds, Mr. W. B. Converse.

The downhill race started at two o'clock, and although the trail was a fairly easy one, the icy snow made it very fast and the falls were many. Percy Knott of Shawbridge sprung a surprise and nosed out Bott of Montreal by four fifths of a second in the excellent time of one minute and thirty-nine seconds. The Westmount team of Christie, Tirrell, Dalton and Ritchie again came through to a clean win.

The slalom was immediately after the downhill on quite a stiff course set by H. S. Johannsen. This resulted in a clean sweep for the Westmount team, as Christie, Tirrell, Ritchie and Dalton took the first three and the twelfth positions.

Pat Christie was the individual winner, scoring two firsts. Percy Bott, who won the title in 1934, was second with a first and second place. Tirrell and Knott tied for third place.

All credit for the success of the meet is due to the members of the Red Birds Ski Club who so willingly gave of their time and energy to encourage the younger generation in the sport of skiing.
