

it necessary to set the flags so that the runners had to hop and wriggle and twist all the way down the steep drop. Practically all the runners took falls, some of them a number.

This time the visitors forged to the top. Dick Durrance made a run that looked unbeatable, but was equalled by Kaech. They shared first place.

When the results were worked out it was found that Kaech had nosed out his rival, Durrance, by two-fifths of a second in the combined time, with Cochand nearly four seconds behind. Thus the first three places went to a Swiss, an American, and a Canadian respectively. The results were:—

# The Holt-Wilson Trophy

ONLY contestant from outside Montreal among the dozen girls who dared the steep slopes of Mount Baldy, Miss Elfriede (Mickey) Pembauer, stellar Austrian performer captured the Dominion Women's Downhill and Slalom ski titles at St. Margarets last March. Miss Pembauer won both events decisively to earn the Combined Downhill and Slalom Open Championship.

Leading the Canadian competitors in the meet, staged by the Ski Club of Montreal, was Miss Peggy Johannsen of McGill. She placed second in the Downhill on the Mount Baldy Speedway and was fourth in the Slalom to take second in the Combined. Miss Johannsen's performance brought her the Holt-Wilson Trophy, emblematic of the Canadian Women's Closed Championship.

Every racer in the Downhill had falls but good times were chalked up. Miss Pembauer

was clocked in one minute, 33.7 seconds for the half-mile descent, 12 seconds ahead of Miss Johannsen, who ran the course in 1:45.8, Madeleine, Helene and Francoise McNichols, all of the Penguin Ski Club, followed in that order.

In the Slalom the winner demonstrated even more ably the fact that European ski technique is still well ahead of Canadian. The flags were laid out on the new slalom hill on Mount Baldy and the test was a severe one. The contestants ran the same course twice and Miss Pembauer averaged 54.7 seconds.

Second was Miss Dorothy Michaels, Ski Club of Montreal, who averaged 1:17.7, while third was Francoise McNichols in 1:20.3.

Although the Slalom counted only five-eighths as much as the Downhill, in accordance with Federation Internationale de Ski regulations, Francoise McNichols's showing in that event earned her third place in the Combined.

The field was small but it included the best of the Montreal girl skiers and the contestants gave an effective display, particularly in the Downhill, although the difficult run took its toll in spills and lost time. Such points on the course as "Slide-away Corner" and the "Big Schuss" where the corners were a little icy, were particularly hard to negotiate.

Miss Alice Macfarlane of the Ski Club of Montreal, who was one of several girls to finish without poles, broke a ski near the end of the run but managed to finish. Miss Michaels slid off the course higher on the trail and spoiled her chances of placing well in the Combined despite her fine showing in the Slalom later.

After taking one fall on her first slalom run, Miss Pembauer ran the flags without a tumble the second time to be clocked in 51 seconds. Other racers slithered across the icy spots beneath the thin coating of snow and had to climb back for missed flags.

### Important Quebec Ski Development

H. Smith-Johannsen is in charge of a large development twelve miles north of Quebec City at Lac Beauport. An excellent auto road which will be kept open all winter, leads directly to this new ski-ing district. Situated at an elevation of 800 feet, snow conditions are unusually good. Adjacent to the lake are two mountains, Murphy and Taylor, rising 800 feet and 1,00 respectively. Altogether, there will be four jumping hills of various sizes, the largest modeled on the famous Homenkollen Hill in Norway, allowing 150 feet jumps. On the mountain slopes have been constructed downhill and Slalom courses which Mr. Johannsen says will be as fine as any in Eastern Canada. A network of modern trails has also been constructed, and practice hills for beginners and experts. It is expected a chalet complete with all conveniences, res-
